MAJORS: 29 majors and 34 minors

STUDENT BODY: 2,588 students; 1,035 men and 1,553 women.* Approximately 53% are from Florida/ 47% from 43 other states and 32 foreign countries. *Enrollment Fall 2012

STUDENT-FACULTY RATIO: 16 to 1

AVERAGE CLASS SIZE: 18 students

CAMPUS: One of the most unique college campuses in America, Flagler College is home to the historic Ponce de Leon Hall that defines the classic architectural style for many buildings.

LOCATION: The Flagler campus is right in the heart of St. Augustine,

the oldest European settlement in the United States with an historic downtown district only a short walk from campus and four miles from the Atlantic Ocean.

DIRECTIONS: St. Augustine lies east of I-95 on the northeast coast of Florida, 35 miles south of Jacksonville, approximately 100 miles northeast of Orlando.

INTERCOLLEGIATE SPORTS: Flagler competes at the NCAA Division II level in the Peach Belt Conference in 13 sports: Men's – Baseball, Basketball, Cross-country, Golf, Soccer, Tennis/Women's – Basketball, Cross-country, Golf, Soccer, Softball, Tennis, Volleyball



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

COLLEGE SELECTION TIMELINE

FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS



Flagler College consistently ranks among the “Best Regional Colleges” in the South in U.S. News & World Report’s Best Colleges.

STAGE 1: FRESHMEN

- Meet:** get to know your high school guidance counselor
- Develop:** your four-year college-choice plan with your high school guidance counselor
- Explore:** options for college preparation and advanced placement courses at your school
- Locate:** resources for information about colleges and universities
- Become:** active in student groups, sports, and/or the arts
- Timeframe:** start early fall, complete late spring

STAGE 2: SOPHOMORES

- Develop:** this year’s specific plan steps with your high school guidance counselor
- Take:** the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT) and the PLAN® test
- Set up:** college preparatory course work for next school year
- Explore:** college financial aid terminology, processes, and resources
- Research:** college and university websites
- Timeframe:** PSAT–October/PLAN®–November
College Prep Courses & Financial Aid decisions–February, 2nd Semester

STAGE 3: JUNIORS

- Note:** Research colleges and list favorites (5–10)
- Compare:** location, academic programs, rankings, student life, and outcomes
- Contact:** students and graduates from colleges on list
- Discuss:** college plans with parents
- Continue:** regular talks with your high school guidance counselor
- Track:** your school activities, awards, academic & athletic achievements, leadership, and community service starting from grade 9
- Research:** ACT or SAT preparation workshop
- Take:** National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT)-ACT or SAT
- Study:** college entrance requirements courses
- Understand:** college admission requirements
- Explore:** nearby colleges and universities
- Attend:** local college fairs and explore numerous schools
- Timeframe:** NMSQT–October, ACT March/SAT April

STAGE 4: SENIOR PLAN

JUNE-AUGUST

- Request:** application forms, catalogs, financial aid information, and admissions materials from colleges on your list
- Narrow:** your college choices from 10 to 5
- Visit:** the college campuses on your list
- Connect:** with your admissions counselors at colleges of your choice
- Research:** local, regional, national and college-sponsored scholarships and grants
- Take:** ACT or SAT preparation workshop

SEPTEMBER

- Create:** a resume detailing your high school activities, achievements, awards and special honors, praise from teachers
- Finish:** your application forms (paper/online) and have your counselor review them, pay special attention to the essay
- Give:** your high school guidance counselor permission to mail your high school transcripts to your chosen colleges
- Take:** required entrance tests (ACT, SAT, Achievement), ensure your scores are forwarded to your selected colleges
- Maintain:** your academic grades (or raise them) to be considered for scholarships



Nearly 87% of Flagler graduates accept positions or get into graduate schools within six months of graduation.

OCTOBER/NOVEMBER

- Send:** applications and transcripts to your selected colleges



JANUARY-MARCH

- Complete:** Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to obtain need-based state and/or federal financial aid
- Recheck:** ask your high school guidance counselor about local scholarship opportunities you might have missed
- Review:** your selected colleges to confirm your choices; compare location, academic programs, rankings, student life, and outcomes a final time
- Request:** ask your high school guidance counselor to send your first semester grades and any new achievements to your selected colleges
- Continue:** exploring financial aid opportunities and checking scholarship information

APRIL-JUNE

- Prepare:** to be accepted at one or more of your selected colleges
- Track:** deadlines, acceptances, rejections, and financial aid awards
- Decide:** upon notification, choose which college you will spend the next 4 years
- Respond:** give a prompt reply to your college of choice
- Join:** campus groups, organizations, and social media that extend invitations
- Submit:** the required deposit at your college of choice for admission and housing
- Celebrate:** you’ve just made the best decision of your life
