DR. ANGEL ADAMS PARHAM

Dr. Parham is Associate Professor of Sociology and senior fellow at the Institute for Advanced Studies in Culture at the University of Virginia. Parham is also the Associate Director for UVA's major in Political and Social Thought where she equips students to examine transformations in political and social thought from antiquity through the present. She is the co-founder and executive director of Nyansa Classical Community, which provides programming for students from diverse backgrounds, inviting them to take part in the Great Conversation and pursue truth, goodness, and beauty. Her recent book, co-authored by Anika Prather, is entitled *The Black Intellectual Tradition: Reading Freedom in Classical Literature* (2022).



ALEX JULIAN

Alex Julian is a managing consultant with Arcadia Education. Before joining Arcadia, Alex spent thirteen years at Great Hearts Academies. He began his career as a teacher of history and humane letters, and taught every grade in the Great Hearts upper school curriculum. As a Senior Headmaster, Alex led multiple classical schools to success. Professor Schultz is an assistant professor of Classical and Liberal Education at Flagler College. She holds a Ph.D. in Philosophy of Education from Loyola University Chicago and an M.A. in Humanities from the University of Chicago. Her research and teaching interests include philosophies of art, aesthetic and art education, and the environmental humanities. Professor Schultz's doctoral dissertation is titled, *Things of Beauty: Aesthetics for Environmental Education.* Most recently, Dr. Schultz has written on aesthetics of misinformation and the sublime in nature-based education.



DR. DOUGLAS KEATON

Professor Keaton earned his Ph.D. from the University of Cincinnati in 2010 and has been teaching at Flagler College since 2012. For most of that time he taught in the Humanities department, leading classes in ancient and modern philosophy, existentialism, philosophy of science, and philosophy of video games. Recently he has transitioned to chairing the Core Department, specializing in general education courses for students making the transition from high school to college. In that role he teaches the First Year Seminar as well as Living in a Digital World.

With over two decades of extensive experience in a variety of educational settings, Hope Carrasquilla is a seasoned educator known for her commitment to fostering academic excellence. Her journey in education began with a degree in elementary education from Florida State University, followed by a Master's degree in Educational Leadership from the American College of Education. Throughout her career, she has demonstrated her versatility by teaching across grades 1-8. She has assumed pivotal roles as an administrator and head of school at two classical schools. Her rich and varied professional background has given Carrasquilla a unique perspective on education and best practices, cultivating a profound passion for classical education.



DR. JOHN YOUNG

Professor Young holds doctoral and master's degrees in Medieval Studies from the University of Notre Dame, a diploma in Jewish Studies from the University of Oxford, and a bachelor's degree in history from Brigham Young University. He teaches a wide variety of courses on various historical layers of and thematic emphases within European and African history. His research focuses on the intersections between the culture, politics, and economics of the high Middle Ages, with a particular emphasis on monasticism and Jewish-Christian relations. He also has a secondary research interest in Mormon Studies.

Professor Sweet holds a Ph.D. and M.A. in philosophy from Saint Louis University. She was born and raised in Mobile, Alabama, where she received her B.A. in philosophy from the University of South Alabama. She spent the 2022-2023 academic year at the University of Notre Dame as a Postdoctoral Research Associate for the Center for Philosophy of Religion. Sweet specializes in epistemology, ethics, and philosophy of religion. Most recently, her research centers on the recognition of and appreciation of value and their roles in the development of intellectual virtue.

In her time with Great Hearts Academies, she has served as a classroom teacher, curriculum author, faculty trainer, math specialist, and administrator.
